Children's Curriculum

Intermediate. In The Sermon on the Mount, students will learn that Jesus gave an overview and summary about what life as a follower of Christ should be. It is directed by internal motivation, rather than by outward works for show, and influenced by the Holy Spirit, rather than by the letter of the law.

Primary. The Parables of Jesus will show students that parables were not just interesting stories. Each one contained vital gems of truth for people back then and for us as well. Through them, we come to understand God's great love toward sinners, His mercy and forgiveness, our desperate need for Him, and His invitation to the greatest wedding celebration of all time.

Preschool. Lessons in *Jesus' Parables:* Special Stories with Special Messages introduce students to some of Jesus' important parables. In these familiar stories, they will come to understand the meanings within them. Students will also learn that they must not only understand these truths Jesus taught but also live according to them.

Aaron Wilbert Fauth passed away on December 31, 2017, at age 96. He was born to John and Pauline Fauth on May 5, 1921, in the Baylor community north of Glasgow, Montana.



In 1950, Aaron married Gladys
Tilley Moore, a widow with two young children
(Delores and Amous), and did custom farming for
many years. He also pastored the congregation in
Toppenish for several years.

Aaron and Gladys had five sons (Timothy, Nathan, Mark, Ornan, and Terry) and were married 61 years at the time of Gladys' death at age 92. He is survived by two brothers, a son, daughter-in-law, two step-children, 13 grandchildren, and numerous great-grandchildren, nieces, and nephews.
